squirrels were glad to see them back.

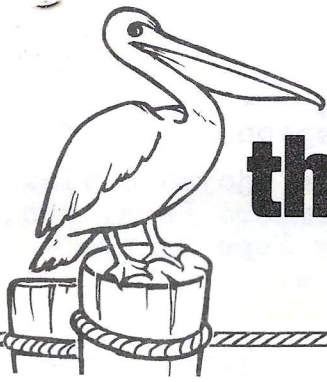
Lu Rogers is so darn busy we can never
