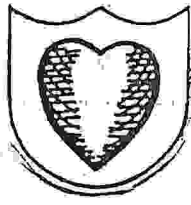

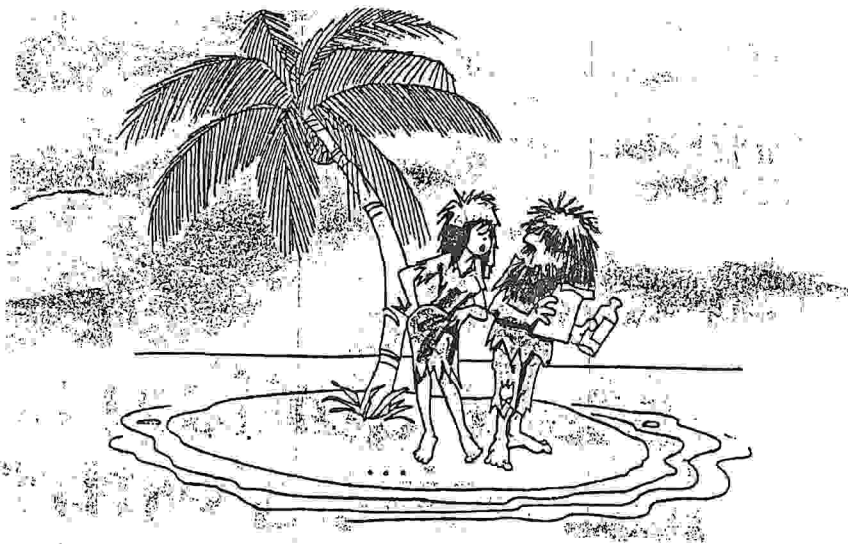
Noticed walking along the seawall that China doesn't look so close anymore, the sink holes have finally stopped sinking and are holding the stone and sand.

Fish Tales

Liars Dock

Evenings spent fishing off of "Liars Dock" has brought nothing in but moans and groans. Shrimp have been hard to come by and they are getting recycled at a fast pace; seems like they go from the net-to the hook-to the fishies bellies. All in that order.

An odd variety of catches, flounder here and there, a jack, pins, crabs of different species, sugar trout and the infamous lady fish. The most action I have seen was a warm evening and high tides; Went down by the cleaning dock and the water was so alive with different sea creatures it looked like an aquarium. Spent quite a bit of time peering in, almost felt like an intruder.

Fishermen going out in boats have been doing quite well, no exact number, but late afternoons you can see the pelicans dining with all the left overs. Have noticed a decline in fishing boats at night also.

Very briefly here are the size and quantity limits of some of the more popular fish we catch in state waters locally as of January 1, 1991.

Species	Minimum size	Limit
Amberjack	28 inches	3
Black Drum	14 to 24 inches	5
Cobia	33 inches	2
Dolphin	none	10
Flounder	11 inches	none
Grouper	20 inches	5
Spanish Mackerel	12 inches	5
Redfish	18 to 27 inches	1
Seabass	8 inches	none
Trout	14 to 24 inches	10
Mangrove Snapper	10 inches	5

For snook the minimum size is 24 to 34 inches but that season is closed until March 1, 1991.

These rules and regulations are in effect to preserve fishing for the future. For additional information on federal regulations and other species, please call the Florida Marine Patrol at 1-800-342-5367. Ignorance of these regulations is not an excuse if you are caught with undersize fish, too many or species that are out of season.

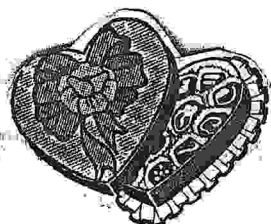
Mickey and Bob Wagner just made the deadline - they have been up in the northern part of Florida where it has been raining.

by apply pressure at the proper times an angler can bring even a large tarpon to its knees in short order.

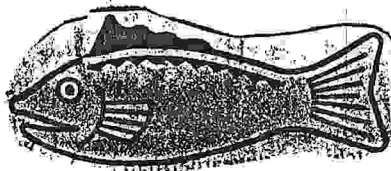
every fish we had a try at thumbed its nose at us, as it got away.

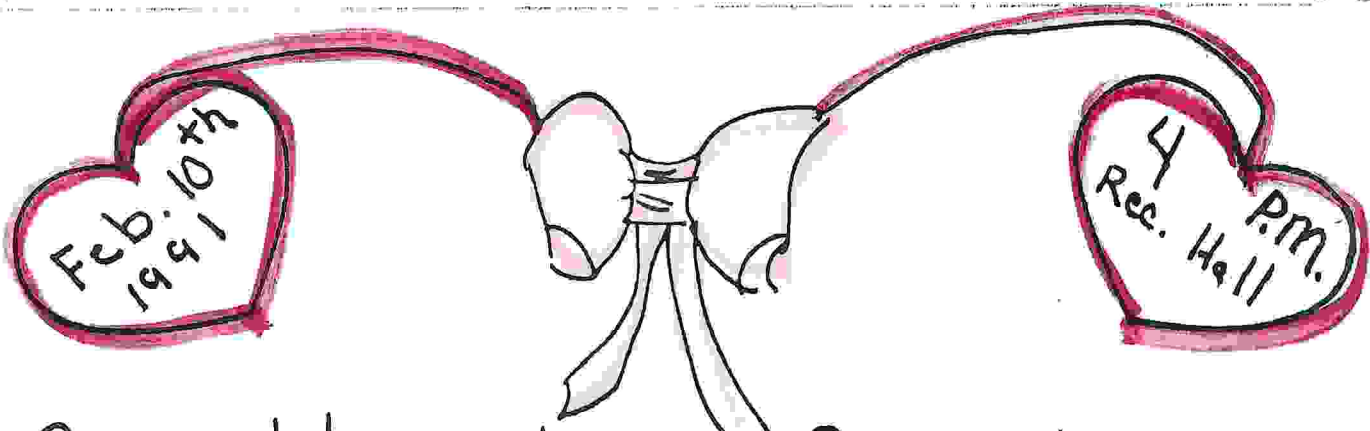

 Or a disaster's news is loud.

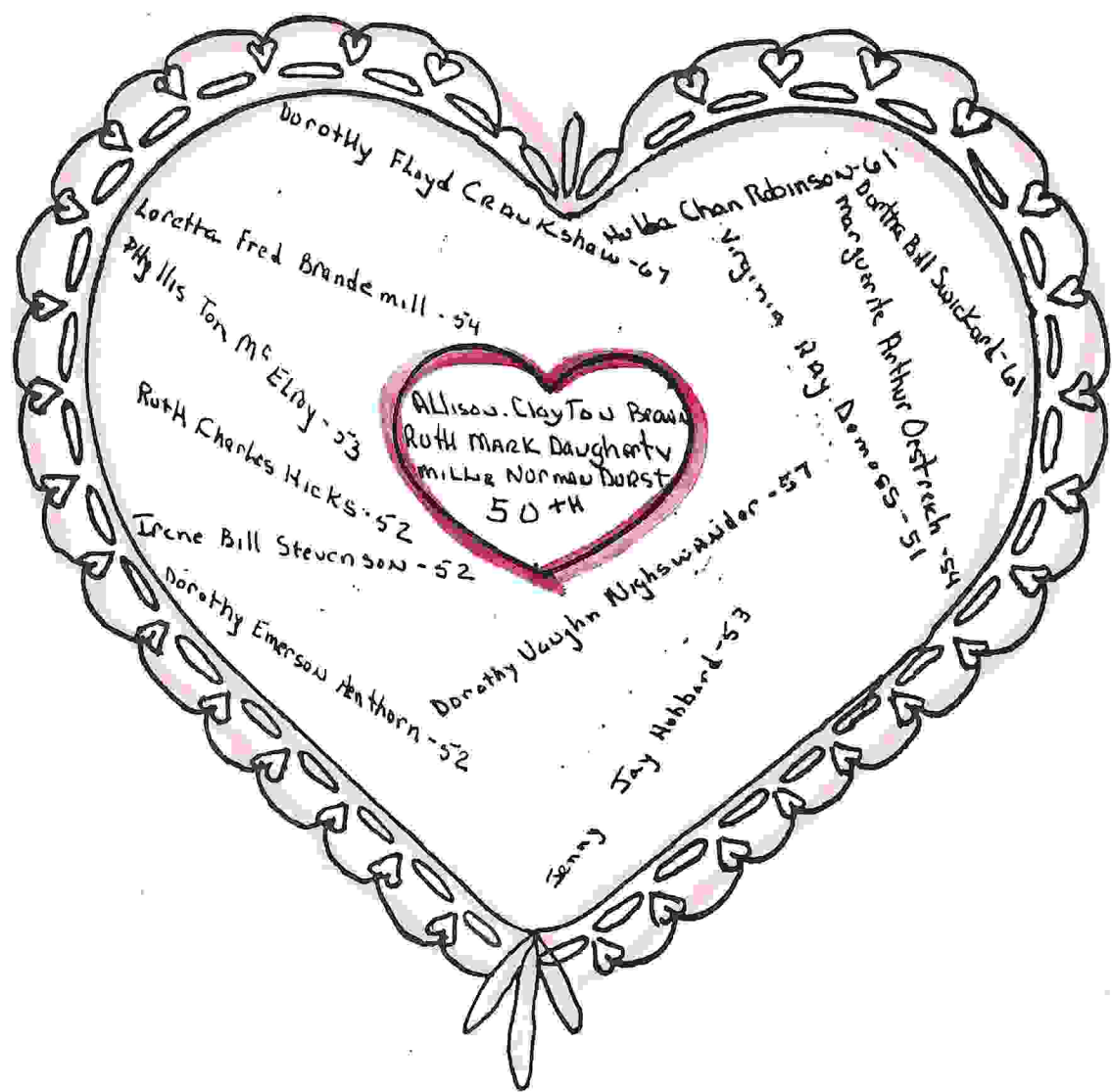
There's no substitute in comfort,
